

MODEL RAILWAY CLUB HOMELESS

Syston Model Railway Society are urgently looking for a new home after a recent electrical and safety inspection found the club rooms dangerous and unsafe.

The Club have enjoyed over 30 years of building model railways at the Old School, Melton Road, Thurmaston but this will now have to be vacated. Various members layouts have appeared in national magazines and one Club layout, Horse Cove, is due to appear in a national magazine in the near future.

Over the last 25 years the Club have organised a very popular model railway exhibition currently in Sibley, Leicestershire. Over the past 8 years nearly £3000 has been donated to local charities. This year £450 will be donated to Rainbows

Chris Leach, from the Society, said, "We are willing to consider anything. We know that finding space of 1200sq feet, insulated and secure, with electrics, access to water and a toilet at a price we can afford will be difficult. However, surely there must be some industrial, warehouse, or farm premises available somewhere in Syston, or nearby area."

East Goscote Village Hall Report April 2019

To begin, I am delighted to be able to tell you all that we have now had a new roof installed on the Village Hall along with 14 solar panels which were added on Friday, 15th March 2019.

As a reminder, funding for this project has been secured with the help of Charnwood Borough Council, the East Goscote Parish Council, and Tesco's "Bags of Help", along with some kind donations from a couple of residents within the village.

Party bookings are also looking healthy. There was a slow start to the year with "Regular" bookings being the main source of income.

However, by the end of January and the start of February, there was something on every weekend, along with "Regular Bookings". It looks like March is going to be very busy too!

We have purchased **18** new chairs and **4** new tables, and a Portable Appliance Test (PAT) was carried out in January of this year.

The fitting of the new kitchen in the Village Hall will be carried out during the Easter Holidays.

Finally, I would like to thank all of the Members of the Village Hall Management Committee for generously offering their time, support and good-will. They do a great job contributing their talents and skills to the team.

Editors Note

In the last edition of Long Furrow, it was inferred in the Borough Councillors report, that the Parish Council was not interested in a defibrillator for the village. In fact, the council created a working party to organise the equipment and they made up the shortfall of the cost of purchasing and setting up the defibrillator. In addition training is to be organised by the council and the council have agreed to pay for the service and maintenance of the equipment. The council have congratulated the people who raised the money for this equipment.

Local Police Team Advice



What to do in the event of an Road Traffic Collision (RTC): No matter how big or small you are legally required to stop and exchange details even if there's no one with the other vehicle or damaged property you should leave a note or call Police.

Despite it being a potentially stressful situation it's important you remain calm. Don't admit liability nor pressure the other driver, just worry about everyone's immediate safety. Let your insurer sort out who's responsible and any needed reparations. That's why you pay them.

Stop Safely - First things first, find a safe area to pull over onto the side of the road where you aren't in danger of another vehicle colliding with you. Consider 999 if this isn't possible.

Check road safety – Ensure there's no dangerous debris remaining in the road or immovable vehicles in dangerous positions. Consider 999 if there's danger of another RTC.

Check injuries – Check with all involved drivers, passengers and pedestrians and ensure everyone is safe and without injury. Consider 999 if there's any serious injuries.

Exchange details - Proceed to exchange details with other drivers primarily you should exchange;

Full name and address of driver,

Full name and address of registered keeper if different from driver,

Phone numbers,

Vehicle registration,

Vehicle make model and colour,

Insurance details.

Prepare to leave - Once you have exchanged details you can leave the scene if it is safe to do so. However depending on damage to the vehicle it may not be safe to drive. If this is the case you must find a way to recover the vehicle. This is normally easiest through your insurance company however if the vehicle is still in a dangerous position normally on a busy or fast road the Police can recover it much quicker but it will be at a cost to the owner.

You should also consider taking pictures of all involved vehicles especially the damage, any damage to street furniture or buildings and where exactly it happened. You could also take note of any potential CCTV, dashcam footage or witnesses. This may help if anything comes into question by your insurance company.

If you are involved with an RTC and another driver does not stop or exchange details they will be committing an offence. The best way to report this to us is by reporting online on <https://leics.police.uk/report-online> It's best to do this within 24 hours of the offence occurring and to ensure you pass as many details as possible including any potential CCTV or witness details. You can also report it by visiting a Police station front enquiry office.

Sign up for East Goscote's Neighbourhood Watch Scheme!

The Neighbourhood Watch scheme in Britain started in the early 1980s and has since grown to 150,000 watches covering 6 million households and roughly 10 million people.



Neighbourhood Watch is the coming together of residents and the po-lice with support from various authorities such the local council and Po-lice Authority. Its strength comes from the community looking out for each other involving simple, neighbourly tasks:

- Reporting suspicious activity to the police
- Sharing information on recent local crimes with neighbours (increasing vigilance & crime prevention awareness)
- Checking on vulnerable neighbours after an incident (creating a caring community)
- Discussing ongoing concerns with neighbours

Earlier this year East Goscote Neighbourhood Watch held a presentation evening where people were given information on the benefits of the Watch in local communities. The overall response was extremely positive with most signing up there and then!

We are now looking to expand the scheme within the village. Membership is FREE.

PARISH COUNCIL CHAIRMANS REPORT



Council and Staff

This year Martin Webbon and Helen Measures joined the council in place of Lisa Castle and Elaine Garner. Unfortunately, Helen resigned soon after and was replaced by Keith Gregory who was subsequently replaced by David Cannon. We currently have 9 Councillors. I have continued as Chairman and I have been supported by my Vice Chairman, Cathy Duffy. Cllr Malpus completed a Fire Wardens Course and Cllr Webbon completed a new councillor course. Whilst the Councillors make decisions, our staff work hard to carry out these decisions to the benefit of the village. Our clerk, Liz Pizer, and our administration assistant, Caroline Taylor also keep us in line with legal and regulatory requirements. Liz also supervises work done around the village. Charlie Cadle continues in the Caretakers role although, Nick Shivers assists when we need an extra pair of hands. Work done by our Caretakers is of a very high standard. Mr Webbon has continued as Tree Warden on a voluntary basis. Our thanks go to all councillors and the staff for their continued hard work.

Planning Applications

During the year 17 planning Applications have been received and considered by the Parish Council.

Remembrance Sunday

The Council purchased 30 poppies to fix to lamp posts in the run up to Remembrance Day.

Gladmans Development

During 2018, Gladmans Land applied for planning permission to build 270 houses on the remaining Rearsby Roses land. The community came together and fought this proposal and the application was rejected. As a result, they have appealed and the enquiry will be held in June. Meanwhile they have reapplied for planning permission.

The council would like to thank Rod Axon for his investigations and KEGGS for leading the fight.

Village Facilities

The Tennis Court is still popular with 101 members. During the winter the court has been closed to protect it and the moss has been cleared from its surface by our caretaker Charlie. Due to Charnwood B C withdrawing

the waste recycling centre in the village, the Parish council has negotiated with independent companies in order to maintain this service in the village.

Vandalism

The cost of vandalism for March 18 – March 19 was again low compared to other years. This was mainly damage to the wet pour surfacing on the play areas.

Dog Fouling

This continues to be a constant complaint received by the Clerk and Councillors, this is despite the fact that over **63,000** dog poo bags have been issued to residents this year and there being a plentiful supply of bins around the Village including a new one on Broome Lane.

The library now distributes the dog bags at 80p per pack of 50, and sales in dog bags continue to rise as they are extremely good bags and represent value for money. Any profit from the sale of the bags is retained by the library as it is managed by the community for the community!

Allowing your dog to foul without clearing up afterwards is totally unacceptable behaviour and we need YOUR help to catch those people responsible for spoiling our streets and green spaces. If you know an environmental offender, call 01509 634564 or email: cleaner.greener@charnwood.gov.uk.

Village Hall

The Village Hall Committee are still doing a great job maintaining the hall, and managing the bookings and finances.

The car park has been lit throughout the winter from 5pm – 9pm giving users a much safer environment when getting in and out of their cars. The Village Hall now has a new roof which contains 2' of insulation which makes the Hall more energy efficient. The Parish Council are trustees of the Hall and assisted the project financially.

The committee work very hard to keep the hall up to a very high standard and are continually working at improving our village hall. Replacement CCTV equipment was installed adjacent to the area around the Village Hall. The hall is having a new kitchen fitted in the Easter holidays and have also financed Solar Panels to the roof as well as LED lighting throughout.

East Goscote Library

The library continues to provide a vital need for East Goscote. As well as the supply of books and computer use, the library has many more functions including the distribution of Dog Bags, Coffee Mornings etc. There will be more about the library later in the meeting.

Parish Phone App/New Website

The success of the Website and the Parish App continues. The website has had 13,051 page views over the last 12 months, and the Parish App has had a total of 723 downloads. To download the app please see details at the end of this report.

Play Equipment

New play equipment has been installed adjacent to Lilac Way. In addition, new steps have been installed alongside the large slide on the mound.

Neighbourhood Watch

Cllr Preston was hoping to expand his Neighbourhood Watch campaign to the rest of the village after the success of its introduction to Rearsby Roses. A recent meeting to improve Neighbourhood coverage of East Goscote was attended by 28 members of the public and proved very successful. The group is now registered with the information commissioner and is sending out regular NHW information to those who signed up. Anyone wishing to receive the very useful information on Crime, scams and useful advice can ask for a consent form from the Parish Council Office and all Neighbourhood watch information can then be sent direct to their inbox!

Christmas Events

In December, in conjunction with St Hilda's, the Village Hall Committee and the Brownies, two events were organised by the library and funded by East Goscote Parish Council. More about these later in the meeting.

Snow Warden Scheme

East Goscote Parish Council is registered with the County Council Snow Warden Scheme. This means that they supply salt and pay the parish council for clearing snow and ice around the village where it is considered dangerous. Charlie and Nick have worked hard spreading the salt whenever we have had snow or icy conditions this last winter. A new salt bin has been installed at the side of the Chemist.

Trees

Mr Webbon is continually checking trees around the village and reporting back to the council. During the year, the Memorial Oak tree has been replaced free of charge and a dead tree adjacent to Lilac Way has been removed. A number of trees on Lilac Way have been pollarded. The hedgerow at the side of the mound has been replaced as the old one had failed in places.

Long Furrow

Gareth Roberts continues to design the magazine with help from the committee members. Long Furrow now has a limited number of hard copies printed but it can be found on line. The committee are continuing to listen to comments and review the way it works. More changes are due this year. The Council continue to support the publication.

Plough

The Plough now has another landlord who has tried to attract new custom using new ideas.

Defibrillator

Lee Smith organised a charity football match to raise funds for a defibrillator for the village. In collaboration with the Council, a defibrillator has been purchased for the pavilion. The council made up the shortfall and agreed to maintain the equipment and provide a steel lockable cabinet.

Leases

A new lease between the Council and Charnwood Borough Council for the land around the pavilion and Scout Hut has been signed.

We are currently awaiting the completion of the lease between the Council and the Scouts.

Speedwatch

The Speedwatch Project proved a success and there is a possibility that another will be staged this year. New speed limits were placed on Broome Lane.

NCS

During the summer a group of students took part in a project to improve.

Next Year's Projects Include:

For next year we hope to continue with the high standard the village is being maintained. We will be looking into ways we can reduce the speed around the village and have a budget to help us with this. We will be once again supporting our library.

Two new bus shelters are being installed – one on Broome Avenue and one by the playing fields. We will be considering supporting a special edition of the Long Furrow which will be delivered to every household and also we are looking at ways to improve the drainage on our playing fields. Finally, we hope to again consider a Christmas event of some sort for the elderly of the village.

MORE GOOD NEWS ABOUT EAST GOSCOTE RECYCLING CENTRE

Nice to have a good news story to lead off with. Following a successful six-month trial period, East Goscote Parish Council has decided to continue its management of our local recycling centre. The weight and quality of recyclables is good and a useful donation to the Village Hall charity continues, mostly thanks to our partnership with the Salvation Army. The removal of another uninvited clothing bank has led to the Salvation Army bank now needing to be emptied more frequently so good news for a good cause. A bit of fly-tipping on the site continues but by dealing with it quickly with the help of volunteers we have contained the problem. Fly-tipping is costly in time and money and is always illegal. It therefore carries very heavy penalties and our recycling centre is closely monitored now. Many thanks to the Parish Council for their continuing support for this project. It has meant additional work for the Parish Council staff and from chatting to people on site, there is no doubt the community do appreciate it.

“EAST GOSCOTE – A GREENER VILLAGE”

Our application to Leicestershire County Council's Shire Grant Scheme to part fund a Bag-for-Life project was not successful so thoughts now turn to an alternative project with a similar message - that we strive to be an even more sustainable community, a better place to live, work and play. Current thinking is along the lines of continuing with a Special Edition of the Long Furrow Magazine delivered to every home in the village. The magazine would include how to get the best out of the recycling and household waste services, composting at home, litter (especially plastic), footpaths and walking, wildlife, the history of our unusual village and so on.

The Long Furrow team will be making the case to the Parish Council to support this alternative project which would at least have the advantage of being entirely under local control. What do you think? Would you be interested in contributing an article or advertising? And see elsewhere in this edition about which direction the magazine should take in the medium to long term. Do we try to go back to a full print run of 1200 – one for every home and business? There seems to be a demand but if so, how do we fund that? Advertising? Donation? Crowdfunding ?!! SPRING IS A BUSY TIME IN THE GARDEN

Spring is and a key time for composting at home. If you haven't already tried home composting, Spring is the best time to start and the Leicestershire County Council cut-price compost bin offer is a good way to begin. Details on their website www.leics.gov.uk. If you are already composting at home, it's time to remove any winter insulation and if re-usable, store it away for next winter. Make use of the mature compost at the bottom of the heap in potting, planting and mulching. If you have room in the garden, move the composter to another site and put the immature compost back in the bin to get the magic started again. A sunny, accessible location is best.

East Goscote Annual Report

It's been another busy year at the County Council, discussions around the financial state of the authority and the debate around local government re-organisation dominated. These haven't gone away and will be important issues over the next 12 months as well, but beyond that I think the biggest 'known unknown' will be the effect the 'B' word has on local government – Brexit. Depending on what (if any) deal is struck for when we leave the EU, Leicestershire could well be faced with new challenges – and new opportunities – that at present it's simply impossible to predict with any certainty.

County Council finances

On Wednesday 20th February the County Council passed a budget balancing surging demand for services and tough financial challenges in a very difficult financial and political environment. The four-year plan sees £94m spent more on services - mainly due to growing demand for social care and special educational needs and disability support - and savings of £75m.

Savings totalling £35m are set out in detail, as well as a plan to reduce special educational needs and disability (SEND) costs by £20m a year, leaving a £20m budget gap. The County Council's share of council tax will rise by 3.99 per cent from April. This equates to £1 a week for band D property and generates an extra £12m to invest in supporting vulnerable people. Most of this will be used to support the growth in the number of adult social care service users and children in care.

These are challenging times. Rising demand for services - especially special educational needs and disability support - is ramping up pressure on the County's budgets. Add uncertainty about local government funding into the picture, and we could see more trouble ahead. But, taking tough decisions and saving £200m since 2010 has put Leicestershire in a strong position, especially compared to other councils and with savings, the books balance for two years before we see a shortfall. As the lowest funded county, Leicestershire County Council is using its finite resources to invest in supporting vulnerable people, set out a significant capital programme without borrowing a penny and have been named the most productive council for the second year.

Securing funding reform remains key. That's why the County Council continues to work with Government ministers to do everything it can to bring about a long-term, sustainable, costed funding plan for local government.

Local Government re-organisation

Since last summer a debate has been ongoing about the way local government works in Leicestershire. At present we have what's known as a two tier structure of local government – the Borough Council (which covers things like collecting rubbish & recycling, street cleaning and planning), and the County Council (which is responsible for highways, adult social care and strategic planning amongst many other areas). The County Council has put

forward proposals to change this to a unitary structure; this is where one Council covers all aspects of local government. The Parish Council would still exist under either form of local government and is therefore in that sense unaffected by this.

Those in favor of these changes point to the savings a unitary authority can make – at present there are eight local authorities in Leicestershire, seven borough/districts and the County Council. This means there are eight Chief Executives, eight Directors of Finance etc. One Council would only have one senior management team and therefore savings would be made there. Another advantage proponents of unitary status make is the ability to join up services better. If we take waste collection as an example, in East Goscote, Charnwood Borough Council collect rubbish, recycling and garden waste but then Leicestershire County Council is responsible for disposing of it. As each borough/district can decide for itself what it recycles this leads to inconsistency across the county. A unitary authority would both collect and dispose of waste itself.

Those who oppose Leicestershire having one unitary authority argue that if Leicestershire became a unitary it would become too remote from residents and wouldn't be as responsive to local needs. Leicestershire (not including Leicester City which is separate and unaffected by this debate) would be, by population, the second largest unitary council in the country (after Birmingham). This would then raise questions about how the unitary would set its priorities – an example of this would be areas such as the very rural vale of Belvoir and Hinckley (which has a close affinity with the west midlands towns) would be covered by one local council but would have potentially have quite different priorities and needs.

Any change in the structure of local government would need an Act of Parliament to come into effect and there is a significant difference of opinion locally about how desirable a change would be – but the debate has now started and will likely continue in the coming year. Ultimately Councils exist to provide the best services possible to local residents whilst ensuring local accountability. This is what is always at the forefront of my mind regardless of what structure we have in Leicestershire.

As I said above I work very closely with them and see the commitment they show to making East Goscote a great place to live. This year I've worked especially closely with Cllr Kevin Preston who runs the village's Neighborhood Watch. When thinking of what makes an area desirable to live in, security and personal safety always feature very highly. Having such an active Neighborhood Watch is therefore a great thing for East Goscote and I'd like to thank Kevin and the team for the work they do with this. Thank you to Edward Argar MP, with whom I worked on a number of East Goscote matters in the past year and finally thanks to Cllr Sue Gerrard, who is stepping down as East Goscote's Borough Councillor after four years' service to the village. I wish Sue all the best for the future and look forward to working just as closely with her successor after the Borough elections in May.

LIBRARY REPORT

The last year was a year of consolidation. From this month we will have a reduced income from Leicestershire County Council and therefore we have to be careful with our budget and rely on fundraising even more than in the past two years. It is estimated that our expenditure in this next year will be at least £3500. This expenditure now includes our fire and intruder alarms, Boiler Maintenance, Water maintenance checks and door servicing amongst others. In addition, from November, we will have to pay for our photocopier/scanner.

We have built up a balance of around £14,000 due to the generosity of various organisations and individuals within East Goscote and the surrounding area; including East Goscote and Queniborough Parish Councils, and various groups based at St Hildas.

The Santa event in the library proved continues to be a big success with the children and we thank the Parish Council for supplying the Christmas presents for those who attended. We also arranged the Afternoon Tea for the more senior of our residents. 45 residents attended and they enjoyed a tea and music from our Paul Kirton Smith and friends, Our waiters for the afternoon were a group of keen Brownies who were supervised by Brown Owl (Rosemary Fraser). We would like to thank the volunteers who organised and ran the event, Rosemary Fraser and East Goscote Parish Council who funded the event.

Laurie Needham and Rod Axon have organised a talk about the history of East Goscote. The interest in this event has proven to be so high that a repeat is to be organised. Marie Pole runs a Coffee Morning on Wednesdays which is now well established. Marie has also run a successful Christmas Raffle and Gill Taylor and Jean Calder organised one at Easter.

The sale of Dog bags has gradually increased since the library took control of the distribution.

Other events that have been organised are the Valuation event, the indoor car boot and the fashion show. All of these events proved to be successful and will be repeated during the next year.

A fundraising committee has been formed to find ways of much needed extra funds for the library. If anyone has ideas for raising funds, please talk to this committee or leave details at the library. The committee is Gillie Clarke, Laurie Needham, Nick Shivers, Marie Pole, Jean Calder, Becky Child and Sheila Jones. As a result of the Members Grant from Charnwood Council, the Library has new external LED lights. These lights work on sensors and will therefore reduce our energy usage. We would like to thank Sue Gerrard for supporting this grant.

YOUR COUNCIL TAX PRECEPT EXPLAINED

The primary source of income for most Parish Councils comes from the Precept, part of the Council Tax. We hope to explain the contribution you make to the Parish Council through your Council tax and how it is spent.

WHAT IS A PRECEPT?

The Parish Council receives a small proportion of the local Council Tax. It does not receive any direct funding from Central Government. The funding collected pays for the running of the Council and the services it provides.

HOW IS IT CALCULATED?

The Parish Council makes an estimate of income and expenditure for the next financial year, including some for future planned projects and/or unexpected events. It is then calculated as an amount per Council Tax Band D Property and added to the Council Tax Bill of all the dwellings within the Parish area.

HOW IS IT RAISED?

Charnwood Borough Council collects your Council Tax on behalf of the Borough Council, County Council, Police, Fire and the precepts for any Parish/Town Councils in their district. It is important to note that East Goscote Parish Council's precept is just a small percentage of your overall Council Tax Bill.

HOW MUCH IS IT?

This year, there is a small increase in the precept charge to East Goscote residents. The precept has an increase of 1.96%. From April 2019, the cost per average household (Band D property) has increased from £60.56 to £61.75 per annum. Our total budget for 2019/20 amounts to £85,300, however using some of our reserves we can reduce our requirement to £58,000. This figure is divided by the Council Tax Base to arrive at £61.75 per Band D property.

HOW IS IT SPENT?

Your precept is spent on maintaining the provision of all facilities and services the Parish Council offers as shown in the graphic

VILLAGE IMPROVEMENTS

During the next year (2019/20) we have allocated funds to install two new bus shelters (Broome Avenue/Playing Field). We have also allocated budgets to investigate a) ways to reduce village speeding and b) better drainage on our playing fields. We hope to continue to support the Library and the Village Hall and continue to hold a Christmas event for the elderly.
