

# Parish Council Report May-July 2016

This past quarter has seen some changes to the council. Our well loved caretaker Nick Shivers retired in April after thirteen years of dedicated service. Chairman, Sally Lander summed it up best when she said Nick was "the face of the village" and as anyone who has met Nick will know, that face is a kind, friendly one that will be much missed!

An equally friendly face, however will now continue that role - Mr Charlie Cadle. We wish him the best of luck as our caretaker and are delighted to welcome him on board.

We have also seen a new councillor co- opted, , Mr Mehmet Gonulalan, on 8th June. Cllr. Gonulalan has lived in East Goscote since 2015 and has a background in law and ethical compliance. Our AGM on 11th May saw Sally Lander re-elected as Chairman and likewise John Malpus has been re-elected to serve as vice chairman for another year.

We now have a full council again with enthusiastic councillors holding a wealth of skills and talents to serve the needs of the village.

East Goscote Parish council has also been busy improving our green spaces and buildings. The village hall has had roof repairs and the pavilion has had some interior decoration and improvements.

We received feedback from residents on the new Ling Dale play area equipment and many of you said more seating was required. Well you asked, we listened! # Library News

The training of volunteers was completed on May 28th and the staff of East Goscote Community Library were ready for action!

The handover of East Goscote Library to the community officially took place on Saturday 4th June and normal lending service recommenced on the following Monday. The library was officially reopened by Gemma Denham, a local illustrator and author of childrens' books.

After the cutting of the ribbon, the public were able to go into the library to see the changes that have been made to the layout of the shelves. They were also able to sample cakes donated by Charnwood WIGS and a hot drink.

On Sunday morning John Malpus made his way to Melton to appear live on 103TheEye. He was interviewed about community libraries and East Goscote in particular.

Initially, few changes will be made until all of the volunteers are confident with the management system. There are plans to introduce various activities to the library, the first of which will be Romp & Rhyme, an activity for the very young. This will be held on the first Friday of each month starting on July 1st at 9:30am.

The Trustees would like to thank the following for their help in whatever way – Leicestershire Council, East Goscote, Rearsby and Queniborough Parish Councils, Voluntary Action Leicestershire, Charnwood WIGs, The retiring librarians Ruth and Alison, The various Church organisations, Tricia Marsland, Josiah Hincks, members of the communities of East Goscote and the surrounding areas, East Goscote Pharmacy and our volunteers.

The library still needs volunteers especially on Saturdays. Even 3 hours once a month would be a help. Funds are also needed and so we ask that you try to support our events. With regards to this, would a Friends of East Goscote Library be supported by residents? A suggestion that has been made would be that each member pays £24 per year and each quarter a draw would be made and the winner of the first three draws would win a minimum of £50 and the winner of the fourth draw would win a minimum of £90. For this to work we would need a minimum of 20 members. Comments please to the Library.

Also from July 1st, we have been distributing dog bags on behalf of the Parish Council. The cost is the same: one free bag per month and 50p for any extra.


In the near future, we will be holding talks as well as games evenings, quizzes and a Book Club if there is enough interest. There are several other ideas we are looking at.

To continue, the library needs your support. You can register with the library free of charge and take out up to 12 books at a time for up to three weeks. The library also needs to pay its way and so any contributions will be welcome. In the last edition, we showed how purchasing goods on line can help us. Easyfundraising is easy to use and no personal information is asked for.


Look out for my next title 'As I was walking' which is due out this summer, and be sure to visit the Loogabarooga festival in October where I will be running an illustrative workshop.

We look forward to all our new children starting with us very soon and wish you all a wonderful Summer.



## From little seeds...

Seed bombs are made from clay, with compost and seeds inside. Once they are dry, they either explode when they hit the ground, releasing the seeds, or melt in the rain. (Picture?) They are great fun to make and throw and they create a lovely carpet of flowers.

By planting these native seeds, the children got a little lesson in the life cycles of plants and, it is hoped, civic duty and become invested in caring for their village.

They had such fun doing this and will have a lasting pride in the tribute which should return year on year.

Our great thanks go to Broomfield school for facilitating the mornings activity, the children of KS1, and to Nick Shivers, Caroline Taylor and Liz Pizer for helping to make the seed bombs.

#### Fancy making your own seed bombs?

Take some air drying clay and shape into a thin, flat circle around 10cm in diameter. The thinner the better.



Put a large pinch of compost and a small, sprinkle of seeds in the centre. Then close the clay, like a parcel, around the mixture. Roll into a firm ball using your hands.


Leave the bombs to dry for a few hours or overnight, in a dry place. They will then be ready to throw on to a sad patch of ground or brighten up a garden.


Make sure you use bee friendly, native wildflowers and give our wildlife a helping hand!

# Changes at the Church!!

Church and Change are usually two words which seldom go together, change is often seen as unwelcome, making differences to things that we want to remain the same for our own comfort. But in the words of US President J.F. Kennedy

'Change is the law of life. And those who look only to the past or present are certain to miss the future'.

I had the privilege of leading assemblies at two of our local primary schools just before the end of term and used the theme of change. At school, particularly primary school, change is what the children experience both daily and at the end of each year. There are new things to learn, new classes, new teachers and new schools in many cases. The children expect it and seem to take it in their stride. I wonder why as adults we find change so disturbing and often oppose it without considering that without it we may well miss a much brighter future.

At St Hilda's we have seen positive change in our building recently, this has included new windows to the park facing side of the church and new internal screens. 

**The Under 9 boys** had another successful season and recently came second in a tournament at Aylestone. Well done to you all.





#### HEDGEHOG RESCUE!

My granddaughter, Poppy, loves hedgehogs. I'm not sure why, that's just the way it is. So when we found out that Coleen Powell, the founder of Leicester Hedgehog Rescue, would be explaining all about them and best of all, bringing along a real hedgehog, we simply had to go. The Hedgehog Event was held at The Green Place in Sileby. Children and adults alike were fascinated to hear all about these wonderful little animals and how to help them.



#### Here are a few hedgehog facts:

- They have been around for about 15 million years far longer than we have.
- They are distantly related to the shrew and they are warm-blooded mammals.
- They are called hedgehogs because they were often found in hedgerows and they have a snout.
- They have about 6000 hollow spines or quills which are for defence from predators.
- In our climate they need to hibernate in the winter and must build up their weight to survive.
- Hedgehogs in the UK are thought to be declining at about the same rate as tigers globally!
- They're mostly nocturnal so if you see one in the daytime, it's probably in trouble.

# And here are a few things which make life difficult for hedgehogs:

- Toxic slug pellets containing metaldehyde (usually blue in colour) see links for alternatives.
- Ponds without a shallow end, a ramp or a way to scramble out. They can swim but need an exit.
- Litter or netting in which they get tangled up or get their heads stuck.
- Gardens without an untidy bit and with fences all round, especially concrete gravel boards
- Bread and milk left out by well-meaning people. Non-fishy cat or dog food and water is best.


It's so good to know that RCVs (Refuse Collection Vehicles – you know "Trashy" and his mates named by Charnwood Primary School kids) leave our round and tip directly onto the tipping floor at Casepak. A group of experienced ladies pounce on the load sampling it, analysing it and knowing where it came from, feedback to CBC officers in Loughborough. From my own observations, I don't think East Goscote has too much to worry about but as always it's worth mentioning to keep out the food waste. Empty containers are what is needed. The bulk of the load then enters the system leaving a minimal percentage of residual waste. The economics of the plant rely on keeping that element to a minimum.




How long's a long furrow?

When plowing with horses or cattle, it was standard practice to rest the animals, and the farmer, after plowing a furrow 1/8 mile long. An eighth of a mile therefore became known as a furrow-long or furlong (660 feet, about 200 metres).

Forty rounds of the horses, 80 furrows, would have been ~66 feet across. This became known as an Acre; a long furrow 660 feet x 66 feet; 43,560 square feet. This was considered a good day's work with a walking plow!
