POLICE REPORT

We regularly read in the papers, hear on the radio, or watch on TV about road traffic accidents. You may see when out and about the aftermath of a traffic accident. There could be Police, ambulances and fire service in attendance. Blue flashing lights and it can appear quite disturbing . You will wonder if anyone's been injured or worse. If it's a motorway or main road any accident will usually cause lanes to be closed, leading to delays and traffic jams. When we see this we feel sympathy for anyone injured and if it looks particularly serious it should be a wakeup call for us all to naturally think more about our own driving skills.

It always saddens us when we hear of people who have been injured or worse in an RTC (Road traffic collision) and the effect it has on relatives and friends.

It is a fact that many RTC`S occur due to poor driving skills, not reading the road ahead. People may be seen eating an apple, chocolate bar or drinking from a can or bottle whilst driving along. These are things drivers should never do. Both hands should be on the steering wheel and totally focused on their driving. A lapse of concentration could cause an error which could result in an accident.

The 30mph speed limit is used mainly in urban areas and villages & wherever you see street lights, unless otherwise stated.

The 40 and 50mph limits are mainly used in non-built up areas and where the national speed limit of 30 mph is not appropriate. The national speed limit for most vehicles is 60mph on single carriageway roads and 70mph on dual carriageways and motorways.

The Police often receive complaints about motorists exceeding speed limits. In East Goscote it's usually on Long Furrow and Melton Road where a number of vehicles can and will exceed the 30mph speed limit. In my time on the beat colleagues and I have conducted a number of speed pop checks on Long Furrow and we will continue to do so in the future to get the message out that speeding irresponsibly is unacceptable.

I ask to that you motorists respect the national speed limits and accept that they are there for a reason, I cannot believe that any driver would put themselves, their passengers and pedestrians IN DANGER by driving their vehicle whilst using a mobile phone. Some drivers will do so whilst knowing that they're breaking the law.

DON'T break the law by exceeding the National Speed Limits . DON'T drink and drive. DON'T use a mobile phone whilst driving. DON'T forget to engage your seatbelts Don't be distracted whilst driving; that way you will be totally focused and less liable to make errors. Let's keep the roads safer for everyone.

We will be celebrating the 25 years Long Service of Mrs Liz Pizer and her service to the Village as Clerk to East Goscote Parish Council this December, which will mark the Anniversary date for her employment.

Liz has for the past 25 years been an excellent steward of Public money and has obtained many grants and funds for the Village.

In her capacity as Clerk she has trained Councillors and Clerks, attended all Conferences at County Hall and Charnwood Borough Council, dealt with the difficult problem of Travelling People on our dog walking area, the clean up afterwards and the organizing of measures to the edge of the Jubilee Playing Field to prevent it happening again.

The facilities that we and our children and grandchildren enjoy on Jubilee Playing Fields were all spearheaded and organized by Liz, the latest being the Tennis Courts and Outdoor Gym Equipment.

Liz has overseen three additional housing developments being added to our village, Lilac Way was particularly difficult. When Liz went to the Village Hall Management Committee it was struggling financially, with her good management it is now a well-run and sound venue for the Village to use.

Liz has organized children's summer play schemes for many years, followed by summer events such as Circus Workshop, Mr Potato-head, and Pet Zoo visits to the Village hall, and also The Santa Christmas events.

When Doctor Shah set up his Medical Centre in East Goscote, he soon made a friend of Liz and it was her children who officially opened the surgery.

Regular meetings with Jelson's Land agents have also meant the swift resolve to any problems with the Industrial Units and the shops.

Liz's Community involvements has also been as Clerk to the Governors of Broomfield School and now with The Community Library.

So very much has gone into the last 25 years as Liz has served this Village with a passion and always fought the Village's corner. We will be marking this special occasion with an inscribed gift and a presentation to show the gratitude of the Village along with Councillors and past Chairmen of our Parish Council.

SEASONAL MATTERS in this edition - I refuse to use the C-word before Advent, so to speak!

The annual end of year holidays fall on Monday 25th and Tuesday 26th December and Monday 1st January. No detail available yet from Charnwood Borough Council but the usual approach is to disrupt as few recycling and refuse collections as possible so I expect our Friday collections will continue as usual apart from Brown bin collections on 29th December and on one other date. Look out for further details from CBC or check their website nearer the time.

This is the most challenging time of the year for the Recycling and Refuse Collection Service so what can we do to help things along and keep our Borough green?

Plan ahead – reduce, re-use, recycle beforehand and make some

Try to reduce packaging (never a bad thing).

Re-use what you are chucking out where possible e.g. charity shops etc.

Check out the excellent Love Food Hate Waste website for making tasty meals from leftovers.

Shop local and support local businesses.

Put extra recycling (correct materials) in coloured sacks (not black) next to your green bin.

Big cardboard can also go next to your green bin. Make sure it

doesn't blow away.

Put your bins out on the recommended day but if things are running a bit late, leave them out. PLEASE PUT CORRECT RECYCLABLES ONLY IN THE GREEN BIN AND NO DISPOSABLE NAPPIES, NO FOOD WASTE AND NO CLOTHING ETC.

MY COMPOST CORNER AT THE GREEN PLACE 6 Cossington Road Sileby (next door to Chine House Vets) will be going into its winter hibernation period on Saturday 16th

December along with the rest of The Green Place. If you are looking for unusual, ethical gifts which don't cost the earth, this is the place but don't leave it too late.
