On August 21st we had to say goodbye to Tim Day who was our vicar for eight years at St Hilda's Church.


Throughout the Pandemic he worked so hard for anyone in need and always with a smile. He established the Foodbank both here and at Thurmaston.

'CHATHEALTH' IN THE FINALS OF NHS INNOVATION AWARDS

Leicestershire Partnership NHS Trust's (LPT) confidential ChatHealth messaging platform is a finalist in an NHS England awards programme, to recognise excellence in health and care innovation, in the Innovation Spread category.

Initially developed in 2012, ChatHealth's safe and secure technology and best practice has been rolled out across the Trust to enable service users in Leicester, Leicestershire and Rutland to reach healthcare professionals via confidential messaging.

LPT's ChatHealth-powered healthcare messaging services include:

- Healthy Together 0-19 (Health Visiting and School Nursing) ChatHealth, for young people aged 11-19 and Parentline for parents and carers of 0-19-year-olds
- The Specialist Autism Team (SAT) ChatAutism offer, for anyone over the age of 14 who has an autism diagnosis
- The Perinatal Mental Health offer, Mum's Mind, for new and expectant mums
- Central Access Point offer, ChatMentalHealth, for anyone needing mental health support
- Musculoskeletal (MSK) Therapy service, which used mass messaging to contact waiting list referrals.

In recent years and throughout the COVID-19 pandemic, interest in LPT's ChatHealth innovation has grown nationwide. Around 70 other NHS Trusts and healthcare organisations have adopted the shared technology and best practice to implement ChatHealth-powered messaging services across

their own localities.

Predominantly used in public health nursing services – 60% of school nursing teams and 35% of health visiting teams now offer ChatHealth services in the UK – its potential has further spread to different types of services such as:

- Sexual health services in Wolverhampton, Bradford, Kirklees, Northamptonshire, Dorset and Lincolnshire
- Mental Health Support Teams (MHSTs) offering mental health support for young people at selected schools in North Yorkshire, Gloucestershire and Bromley
- Specialist care services for patients referred for treatment for children's diabetes and dialectical behaviour therapy (DBT).

In 2021-2022, a combined total of 87,132 messaging conversations took place nationwide, between healthcare professionals and service users via ChatHealth. Feedback from service users is overwhelming positive, with them often saying how it's a more convenient, comfortable and easier way to get help – and showing appreciation that messaging conversations can be carried out anonymously if preferred.

Angela Hillery, chief executive of LPT, said:

"We are extremely proud of this innovation. Chat-Health has gone from strength to strength since it was developed by our teams in LPT, and it benefits children, young people and parents across Leicester, Leicestershire and Rutland due to its confidential, secure messaging platform to access expert clinicians.



It has been particularly vital in supporting those who may not normally reach out for help in any other way. We would like to congratulate all the teams behind its success, including NHS Trusts across the country who have adopted ChatHealth to benefit more than six million people a year."

"We are so proud that ChatHealth has been selected as a finalist for The Innovate Awards. We want to achieve recognition for the inspiring health teams who have adopted ChatHealth nationwide, making it easier for service users to reach local healthcare professionals to get advice and support. This was particularly invaluable during the COVID-19 pandemic, when we saw a greater level of interest in our digital products.

It's incredible to witness first-hand how tried and tested innovations can be utilised across different

types of health services to meet the same goals and achieve positive change. We're honoured to be building a strong community of digital health professionals who are committed and passionate about offering digital care for more convenient and easy access for service users."

The Innovate Awards is a collaboration between the AHSN Network, which operates as the innovation arm of the NHS in England and acts as the collective voice of the 15 academic health science networks (AHSNs); and NHS Confederation, the membership body, representing healthcare in the UK. The Innovation Spread award category recognises innovations that have made the greatest impact and have been scaled and adopted widely and rapidly. Winners of the awards will be announced at a ceremony to be held on Thursday 29 September 2022.

To all Dog Owners of East Goscote,

The amount of Dog mess has increased dramatically on our village.

Can you please ensure that when you or any persons are walking your dog, they always have with them a poo bag. All litter bins and dog bins are for the use of wrapped dog mess and dog bags are available at 80p for 50 bags from the village library.

If your dog is caught fouling and you do not remove it, you can be liable for an on-the-spot fine. We particularly ask that you ensure dog mess is cleared from the Jubilee Playing Fields, especially on the sports pitches where many children play.

We also ask that dog owners ensure their dog is under control at all times.

EAST GOSCOTE - ANOTHER VIEW

I was born in Rearsby in March 1940 and lived there until October 1968 when I moved to Badgers Corner East Goscote. I regularly visited East Goscote to see the progress on the property that I had purchased and noticed that during the summer of 1968 they had started to demolish the mound. However after a number of attempts they had only appeared to scratch the surface of the side of the mound facing the playing fields, due to the fact that it was so heavily reinforced and it became obvious that it was going to be impractical to demolish.

During JeIson's attempt to demolish the mound one of the entrances to same, facing the playing field, had been left open and during the summer of 1968 I went inside the mound. It appeared that from the inside had been constructed and divided into either two or three sections which were completely divided by heavily reinforced walls. The open section that I entered contained a platform, as in railway, and below the platform there was provision for a single rail line (the track having been previously removed). My impression was that the mound had been used for the loading of ammunition onto railway wagons and if there happened to be an explosion in one section of the mound when loading the ammunition the design was such that the other one or two sections would probably not be affected due to heavily reinforced dividing walls.

Subsequently the open section that I had used, which was large enough to accept at least three or maybe four railway wagons in length, was sealed off and the area on the side of the mound that Jelson had previously attempted to demolish was recovered in earth. Also if I remember correctly from early East Goscote magazines, Jelsons did not seal the Air Vents on top of the mound and a child became jammed in the top of one of the vents. The vents were then, obviously sealed off.

With regards to the "Red Roofs" property, I had always understood that it was the residence of the Military Commander responsible for the Ordnance Factory (I was too young to remember it before it was requisitioned by the Ministry) and how many Military Commanders that may have been resident in the property I also do not know, but I remember that one of them had a daughter that attended Rearsby School; the same School that I attended and also that a Mr Arthur Slater from Rearsby was a Gardener at the residence.

With reference to the large "Flat Roofed" White House with large windows, just along from "Red Roofs" towards Rearsby; I believe that this was built by Willik Bros Ltd (Rose Growers) and was occupied by a Mr Van de Velde, his wife and son Robert. He was a Director of Willik Bros Ltd and my mother was engaged by them as a cleaner/ housemaid. I would occasionally go with my mother and play with Robert as he was the same age as myself. Subsequently Mrs Van de Velde passed away and their son Robert emigrated to South Africa. Mr Van de Velde sold the property and moved to Bleakmoor Close in Rearsby, just off Station Lane near the railway and my mother still cleaned for him. I believe Mr Van de Velde passed away on a visit to his son in South Africa and as far as I am aware was buried there. Mrs Van de Velde during her life In the White House was prominent in the

village of Rearsby as she always arranged an Annual coach outing for the children of the village, the first one being to Whipsnade Zoo and subsequently each on-going year after to Drayton Manor Park, where a cricket match was arranged between two teams of Rearsby village children, with the winners receiving an award. She was also a member of the Rearsby village cricket team committee and I remember her occasionally acting as Umpire when required.

In the 1950's I also remember a detachment of the Pioneer Corps being based in buildings that were part of the Ordnance Depot which were situated at the right hand side of the A607 main road when travelling to Leicester, just before the bridge that spanned the Queniborough Brook. They would occasionally be exercised by marching to Rearsby, turning left down Brook Street, turning left again into Mill Road then up to the A607 main road turning right and back to base.

Also in the early 1950's when attending Secondary School in Melton Mowbray the School Bus, which originated in Melton Mowbray would deliver workers from Melton Mowbray to the Ordnance Depot, which it appeared to be then called, and then collect us as school children from opposite the Horse and Groom public house in Rearsby, then turn right to Gaddesby and after collecting more children from Gaddesby, Ashby Folville, Barsby, South Croxton, Thimble Hall, Twyford, Thorpe Satchville and Great Dalby, would return to the A607 just to the East of Kirby Bellars, then turn right to Melton Mowbray. After school finished in the afternoon, the School Bus would make the same trip in reverse, to enable the collection of the workers from the Ordnance Depot and subsequently taking them back to Melton Mowbray.

Also the land corner of the Ordnance Factory with the boundaries of Broome Lane and the A607 was used in the mid to late 195O,s by a company with the name of Murphy Bros who repaired Heavy Duty commercial vehicles, with one of the brothers living in Rearsby House in Rearsby, the entrance to which is the long drive on the left just prior to the Horse and Groom public house in Rearsby when travelling to Melton Mowbray. A number of buildings situated in this same corner plot of land were also used by Auster Aircraft Ltd for storage of surplus aircraft spares and actual dismantled aircraft. When working for Auster Aircraft Ltd after leaving school in 1956 I was occasionally asked to assist in the delivery and collection of aircraft from these buildings. Another long term feature of this plot of land was an extremely high mound of sandy soil with an almost vertical side facing Broome Lane, this vertical side being the home to hundreds of Sand Martins during the Spring/Early Summer nesting period.

I also personally consider the following of personal interest: When living in Rearsby I lived next door to the day-shift stoker who worked in the Ordnance Factory Boiler House and upon moving to East Goscote I found

that my property had been built on the area, or adjacent to the area, where the Boiler House apparently once stood (my garden still contains ample quantities of clinker).

The signal Box for the Ordnance Factory sidings which was active until it closed in the early 1970's and was manned by a Mr Harry Baxter from Rearsby, whom I often saw cycling to and from work through our bedroom window which overlooks the railway and the access road to Beedles Lake. I knew Mr Baxter and his family and his eldest daughter still lives on East Goscote.

When the late Queen Elizabeth II visited Leicester, I believe it may have been 1958, the Royal Train was parked in the Ordnance Factory sidings where the Queen slept overnight, prior to her visit to Leicester the following day.

Hoping the Editor of "What is under the Mound" may find something of interest in the above. (Address supplied)

Ed: I moved here in 1979. At that time, Murphys was where the Willowbrook estate is now. Can anyone confirm that is where it had always been or was it at one time, as the article above states.





OUT AND ABOUT

Following a lot of work on trees and invasive roots, and replacing the safety surfacing, our Lilac Way play area has re-opened. Replacement playground signs are being purchased

for Lilac Way and the Village Green play areas. Staying with trees, we have had the regular professional survey of all of our trees carried out and Leicestershire County Council have also undertaken extensive tree work.

The Parish Council have commissioned a fire risk assessment for The Mound following the exceptionally hot and dry summer. The Long Furrow Wildlife Verge is a partnership project with Leicestershire County Council. We are working to make further improvements next year by adding to the existing wildflowers and bringing more colour and biodiversity to the verge.

Unfortunately, dog fouling is on the increase. Most dog owners are responsible and pick up after their dogs and affordable bags are available at the Library. However, some dog owners clearly don't pick up. On the positive side, the Parish Council, with help from the Rainbow guiding unit, have planted some daffodil bulbs in the shape of a crown on the Melton Road – look out for this next Spring.

THREE EVENTS FOR YOUR DIARY

The Library are hosting the Children's Santa event which will take place on Friday 9th December. The Parish Council are arranging a get together for the Over 65's in the village hall on Saturday December 10th (see separate article) and we have re-booked the well received James Richards Circus for October 2023.

TRAFFIC MATTERS

We are hoping to arrange a meeting with Leicestershire County Council to discuss the traffic on the A607 and an improvement to the traffic and active travel scheme for the new Redrow development. And we have been successful

in our application to Councillor Poland regarding a grant from the members highway fund. As a result the Parish Council have agreed to install a vehicle activated sign on a more permanent basis on Long Furrow adjacent to the brook.

The Parish Council are considering how best to consult the residents to ask what they feel our parish priorities might be.


