MORE EAST GOSCOTE HISTORY

As you are aware I mentioned Murphy Brothers in the article "East Goscote - Another View" in the last Long Furrow magazine. As I stated, Murphy Brothers during 1955 were rebuilding Commercial Vehicles on the corner site where Broome Lane joins the A607. Also some of the existing buildings on this corner site were also being used by Auster Aircraft Ltd who were based on the airfield at Rearsby; just for storage purposes.

Murphy Brothers also had a Civil Engineering section of their business which was situated on the site where the Thurmaston Shopping Centre now stands and they also built a prominent new Headquarters Building, from which they ran a Haulage business, which was situated facing the original A607 road (Pre Thurmaston By-Pass days) on the right hand side of same where the original A607 entered Thurmaston village when travelling towards Leicester. This site as you are no doubt aware is now a large business complex.

The Murphy's to whom you are referring were situated in the area of Willowbrook Way and appeared on the scene sometime later; they were Timber Merchants. It just so happened by coincidence that the two companies operated under similar names, but in no way were they connected.

Another minor item I forgot to mention was that the Ordnance Factory had its own Fire Station situated adjacent to the main entrance to East Goscote and in the late 1940,s every Sunday morning at 11 am they would test their Air Raid warning siren which could be clearly heard in Rearsby village.

Also one of my friends in Rearsby purchased one of the first batch of houses built in the village in Ploughmans Lea, but as it was not ready for occupation Jelson's allowed him to live in the original existing Fire Station House which was situated adjacent to the Fire Station until such time as the property that he had purchased had been completed. The Fire Station and adjacent house were subsequently demolished.

Editor: The timber yard where the Willowbrook development now stands was actually owned by Masseys and not Murphys as I stated in the last edition.



DOG FOULING

To all Dog Owners of East Goscote,

The amount of Dog mess has increased dramatically on our village.

Can you please ensure that when you or any persons are walking your dog, they always have with them a poo bag. All litter bins and dog bins are for the use of wrapped dog mess and dog bags are available at £1 for 50 bags from the village library.

If your dog is caught fouling and you do not remove it, you can be liable for an on-the-spot fine. We particularly ask that you ensure dog mess is cleared from the Jubilee Playing Fields, especially on the sports pitches where many children play.

We also ask that dog owners ensure their dog is under control at all times.

DOG FAECES CAN CONTAIN THE EGGS OF THE ROUNDWORM, "TOXICARA".

If they are ingested or inhaled by Humans it can cause great health risks.

If everyone takes care and is responsibly looking after their dogs, we will have a much cleaner village.



We have a desk space available for you to bring your own laptop to work, or just come along and enjoy some quiet reading time in the comfort of the library.


Tea and Coffee will be able to purchase at a cost of £1 per cup.



GOOD OGC NEWS

Together with our expert Tree Warden, Rod Axon, we have surveyed all 38 of our Queen's Green Canopy trees and only three are definite casualties of last year's drought, 2022 probably being the hottest year on record for the UK. Many thanks to volunteer tree waterers for nursing them through their first year. There will be a bit of trimming and tidying to do but this adds up to an exceptional survival rate. We would expect to lose about 11 in a normal year. Any losses will be replaced and more planted so help will no doubt be needed again this spring and summer. Contact us if you are interested in being a tree carer. Young carers are given a wooden heart to decorate and identify their tree.

THE MAKING OF EAST GOSCOTE - ROD AXON

It was really fascinating to see the article 'East Goscote -Another View' about the mound in the November issue of Long Furrow in response to my previous article. The contributor's memories of the people and places really has been helpful and very interesting.

Since then I was asked to give a presentation on the development of East Goscote to the University of the Third Age (U3A) in Syston and I found more evidence about Jelson's work in this area.

On the day I met a number of people who gave me descriptions of their adventures inside and around various derelict buildings on the Jelson site at East Goscote. I also met the surveyor, who then became the project manger for the whole village. I hope to hear more from him about how the village was built. He said that at the busiest time of construction, Jelson employed around half of all construction workers in

Leicestershire on site. An aerial photo of the site in April 1968 exists in Parish Council records showing the scale of building and my photo of it is below.

You can see that the site was cleared piecemeal, the new houses being built from the south and east. Various old structures are evident even after the new road system had been set out. Remember that the planners had on two occasions originally insisted

that'all buildings and structures' were to be demolished and removed from the site. From original Architects plans Jelson. always intended the mound buildings to be landscape features and you can see rubble and soil around the buildings at this stage. You can clearly see where the quarry is, now the playing field east of the railway, where demolition rubble was placed. Also visible is another quarry where the fishing pond now is, just north of Broome Lane, near to the Lodge farm. The new sewage works is already built which also served surrounding villages. It retained one of the existing Factory 10 double reservoirs that were for fire fighting purposes. (shown as a rectangular structure divided in two near the round treatment ponds).

It is hard to believe now that Jelson's building site was open to all, even the active sites where building was taking place! Everything on a modern site is strictly controlled and all areas of a former industrial site would be fenced off for remediation before building work commenced.

One person at the U3A in Syston described going inside the mound buildings - a large open space inside the mound with the sound of dripping water. I believe the two buildings may be different types so it is difficult to decide which memory relates to which building. Peoples' memories of the exact



structure inside were not clear but photographs on a web site called **Subterranea Britannica** do show the interior of the standard magazine design for Filling Factories. Swynnerton in Staffordshire was a similar factory to Factory 10 (Queniborough) and contained the same designs of building as ours. Perhaps these photos may help re-awaken those memories?

The contributor to the November issue explained about the platform and rails that he had seen. Their description tends to confirm the type of standard magazine design with galleries emerging from the side on to the platform. Due to copyright I can't share these photos but the web site <u>www.subbrit.org.uk</u> has the photos of the interior of the Swynnerton Magazines. if you search for Swynnerton and follow the 'images' link you will find them. Everything on a munitions site was designed to minimise the risk of explosion and minimise the effect of a disaster e.g. thick blast walls but thinner roofs (max. 6 inches).

I can also confirm the contributor's memory that our vent shafts were filled; also mesh was placed over them and that the mounds are entirely safe to walk over; however, without knowing precisely the condition of the whole structure, the mound will need continued monitoring for any movement or changes. Avoiding damage by not using heavy machinery on the roofs should keep this area open as an amenity for decades to come.
