NEW DETAILS REVEALED OF 256-HOME ESTATE 'THAT WILL JOIN UP' TWO LEICESTERSHIRE VILLAGES



New details have been released about a planned, controversial 256-home estate accused of joining up two Leicestershire villages. Outline permission was granted for the development, on fields off Melton Road, East Goscote, by Charnwood Borough Council last year in the face of vocal opposition from residents and from a borough councillor, who said the village and neighbouring Rearsby would "effectively be joined up" if the proposal went ahead.

The council received 176 objections to the proposal, originally submitted by Gladman Developments, but with the land since being bought by Redrow Homes East Midlands. But at a meeting in August 2021, planning committee members agreed the development should go ahead. The decision to approve came after council officers warned that the lack of an up-todate local plan - a document which sets out which areas should and should not be built on - for the area meant the authority would struggle to defend a decision to refuse the application if it went to appeal.

The properties will comprise 10 one-bedroom homes, 44 two-beds, 87 three-beds, 94 four-beds and 21 five-beds, with 77 of the houses to be set aside for affordable rent or shared ownership, according to the application. There will be a section of community parkland across the north of the site, including open grassland, woodland, two bodies of water and a children's play area, the documents add.

At the committee meeting in 2021, borough councillor James Poland warned the planning committee: "If you grant this application today, make no mistake, East Goscote and Rearsby will effectively be joined up, and that will cause substantial and permanent harm to the character and identities of both villages."

But after hearing that the lack of an up-to-date local plan made it more difficult to refuse an application, councillors decided to approve outline permission for the scheme, once the developer had pledged suitable contributions to local infrastructure and other facilities to help the area cope with the influx of new residents, known as a section-106 agreement. Six councillors voted for the plan, and four against.

Planning documents submitted with the new application on behalf of Redrow Homes read: "The site at East Goscote will provide a unique and attractive place to live. The development will provide a mix of house types, tenures and densities to reflect a wide range of household requirements, creating a varied character which responds positively to local vernacular and providing much needed housing to Charnwood. The scheme will make use of its proximity to the village centre, where local services and key community infrastructure are located. Redrow will make use of the existing landscaping to create beautiful green spaces promoting social interaction and a sense of ownership."

Ensure your photo meets the below requirements to avoid delays with your free voter ID application.

Your photo must be: • clear and in focus



Charnwood

- in colour
- against a plain, light-coloured background
- your true likeness, with no photoshop or filters
- at least 45x 35 mm in size and no bigger than 297 x 210 mm
- undamaged (e.g. not torn, creased, or marked)

In your photo you must:

- face forwards and look straight at the camera
- be alone, with no other objects or people
- have a plain expression
- have eyes open and visible, with no hair in front of them
- not wear sunglasses. Normal glasses are fine if you usually wear them
- not have a head covering (except for religious or medical reasons)
- not have 'red-eye', glare or shadows over your face

VOTER ID

Why has voter identification been introduced in polling stations?

We have always had a form of identity check – this is not new. What is new is the production of photographic identification as part of the ongoing developments to ensure the integrity of the election. The policy decision by Central Government flows from a manifesto pledge in the 2017 and 2019 manifestos.

What will be acceptable identification in polling stations?

A voter must present one of the following forms of photographic identification in order to vote in person at the polling station:

- A passport issued by the UK, any of the Channel Islands, Isle of Man, a British Overseas Territory, an EEA state or a Commonwealth country
- A driving licence issued by the UK, any of the Channel Islands, the Isle of Man or an EEA state (includes a provisional driving licence)
- A biometric immigration document
- An identity card bearing the Proof of Age Standards Scheme hologram (a PASS card)
- Ministry of Defence Form 90 (Defence Identity Card)
- A Blue Badge
- A national identity card issued by the EEA state
- An Older Person's Bus Pass
- A Disabled Person's Bus Pass
- An Oyster 60+ Card
- A Freedom Pass
- A Scottish National Entitlement Card issued in Scland
- A 60 and Over Welsh Concessionary Travel Card issued in Wales
- A Disabled Person's Welsh Concessionary Travel Card issued in Wales
- A Senior SmartPass issued in Northern Ireland
- A Registered Blind SmartPass or Blind Person's SmartPass issued in Northern Ireland
- A War Disablement SmartPass or War Disabled SmartPass issued in Northern Ireland
- A 60+ SmartPass issued in Northern Ireland
- Half Fare SmartPass issued in Northern Ireland
- An Electoral Identity Card issued in Northern Ireland
- A Voter Authority Certificate or a temporary Voter Authority Certificate

Coronation Weekend

Saturday 6th May 2023

The Coronation Service at Westminster Abbey

The Coronation Service will take place on the morning of Saturday, 6th May 2023 at Westminster Abbey. The Coronation is a solemn religious service, as well as an occasion for celebration and pageantry.

Their Majesties The King and The Queen Consort will arrive at Westminster Abbey in procession from Buckingham Palace, known as 'The King's Procession'.

After the Service, Their Majesties will return to Buckingham Palace in a larger ceremonial procession, known as 'The Coronation Procession'. Their Majesties will be joined in this procession by other Members of the Royal Family.

At Buckingham Palace, The King and The Queen Consort, accompanied by Members of the Royal Family, will appear on the balcony to conclude the day's ceremonial events.

Sunday 7th May 2023

The Coronation Concert at Windsor Castle

On Sunday, 7th May 2023, a special Coronation Concert will take place at Windsor Castle. Produced, staged and broadcast live by the BBC and BBC Studios, the Coronation Concert will bring global music icons and contemporary stars together in celebration of the historic occasion.

Attended by a public audience including volunteers from The King and The Queen Consort's many charity affiliations, the concert will see a world-class orchestra play interpretations of musical favourites fronted by some of the world's biggest entertainers, alongside performers from the world of dance. The performances will be supported by staging and effects located on the Castle's East Lawn and will also feature a selection of spoken word sequences delivered by stars of stage and screen.

Through a national ballot held by the BBC, several thousand members of the public will be selected to receive a pair of free tickets for the Coronation Concert at Windsor Castle.

Alongside the stars of the concert, the show will also see an exclusive appearance from The Coronation Choir. This diverse group will be created from the nation's keenest community choirs and amateur singers from across the United Kingdom, such as Refugee choirs, NHS choirs, LGBTQ+ singing groups and deaf signing choirs. A new documentary exploring the formation of The Coronation Choir will tell the stories of the people representing the many faces and voices of the country. The Coronation Choir will appear alongside The Virtual Choir, made up of singers from across the Commonwealth, for a special performance on the night. The centrepiece of the Coronation Concert, 'Lighting up the Nation', will see the country join together in celebration as iconic locations across the United Kingdom are lit up using projections, lasers, drone displays and illuminations.

The Coronation Concert will be produced by BBC Studios, broadcast live on BBC One, BBC iPlayer, BBC Radio 2 and BBC Sounds.

Further details about the concert, the national ticket ballot and the line-up will be released in due course.

REDROW

The final stages of consultation on the layout & design of the site closed in March.

I have worked very closely with the Parish Council in responding to the plans. Our concerns, like you, are:

- the number of houses
- traffic, road safety & amp; access issues
- preservation of open spaces & amp; wildlife
- loss of privacy & amp; disturbances to residents
- ensuring the land is safe to build on.

Many thanks to Cllr Rod Axon again, for his tireless research and work that has enabled us to provide a well evidenced, robust response.

I met with Redrow earlier in the year to discuss the problems caused to residents and damage to trees by contractors on the site. I hope to have regular meetings with them to ensure we have the most up to date information about what's happening on site and to give me an opportunity to raise any questions and concerns from residents.

Speeding

Speeding figures have been obtained for the problem areas around the village, which showed cars regularly breaking speed limits. Cllr Shivers and I have raised this with Leicestershire County Council and the police to see what measures can be taken to calm the traffic. Some temporary awareness signs have also been installed around the village following a request from the Parish Council.

I know that traffic and speeding is one of the main worries for people in East Goscote and it is something that I shall continue to prioritise.

Local elections

Elections for Charnwood Borough Council will take place on May 4th . As mentioned previously there will be two significant changes this time around.

One, is that you will no longer elect just one councillor to represent East Goscote. A change by the Boundary Commission means that East Goscote will become part of a new voting area comprising a part of Syston and many of our neighbouring villages. You will be asked to vote for three candidates who will represent not just East Goscote, but for this entire new area. I will be standing for reelection, along with my colleagues Chris O'Neill and Sandra Woodward. I hope that you can support us.

Secondly, is that photo ID will be required to vote at a polling station from now on. Please see the



government website for valid forms of ID, or get in touch and I can provide you with a list. Please take particular care to check this list if you are a younger person, as things like student cards and passes are not accepted. You also have an option of applying for a postal vote which does not require photo ID.

If you do not have valid ID and do not want a postal ballot, then a free certificate can be applied for from Charnwood Borough Council. Either contact them online or 01509 634546 for information on how to apply.

Thank You.

Finally, I wanted to take the opportunity to say thank you. It is an enormous privilege to be your councillor. There have been many challenges, not least the huge effort that myself, other councillors and residents put into trying to stop the new housing development. I continue to do my very best to ensure that the negative impacts on our village are kept to a minimum and that residents are listened to. I am proud to be able to help so many people and to have been a part of so many community projects and events. It's an honour to serve the village and I sincerely hope to be able to continue for another four years.

Thank you to residents, volunteers, councillors and staff who make East Goscote wonderful community and a great place to live.

We have visited the village library to take books out.







PLANNING APPLICATION

There is another planning application for this area - between the junction of the Leicester Western by-pass and Melton Road. The application can be found on the Charnwood Borough Council Planning Explorer ref P/22/2310/2. The development, if approved, will consist of up to 99 dwellings. Access to the site is to be from Melton Road.





"I write this latest update for readers of Long Furrow amid continuing (at the time of writing) Press commentary on some supermarkets having limitied purchases of some salad items, like lettuce, tomatoes or peppers. The issues that have been experienced relate to supply issues, that have come about due to a combination of two external events firstly, the bulk of these out-of-season salad products are imported from countries like Spain, Morocco and Tunisia at this time of year, but those countries have been hit by very harsh winter weather which has significantly reduced their harvests, with intense night frosts, and also incidences of the tomato brown rugose virus killing tomato plants. In parallel, it appears that high energy costs, resulting from the conflict in Ukraine, have impacted on production in Northern European countries which, at this time of year, rely on heated greenhouses to produce salad etc but given the very high energy costs of doing so many have reduced the volume they have planted/ produced.

But, while there are very specific production factors that have caused these issues, it does also highlight an important debate on food production, and farming in the UK as we have seen recently at the NFU Conference. While we all like to be able to enjoy particular foods all year round, even when they are out of season in this country, we should also be clear that that makes us more dependent on out-of-season imports from overseas. That breadth of choice is great, we should not neglect seasonal, locally produced food. While normally in the Gazette I seek to focus on very local issues, given the importance of farming to our country, but also in the area around East Goscote, I wanted to write about something relevant both locally and nationally – supporting our local farmers through buying more locally sourced, seasonal, produce.

When it comes to food, I want people here at home and abroad to be lining up to buy British. I will always champion our excellent British food and drink, from our microbrewery, cider and gin industries, our world-leading beef, lamb and pork produce, to our pork pies and many varieties of fantastic cheeses. We are indebted to our farmers who produce excellent quality food with incredibly high standards of food safety, animal welfare and sustainability, but who in doing so they are also stewards of our precious countryside & rural environment, helping to protect and enhance it for future generations. From start-ups to family farms, to larger agribusinesses, our farming and food and drink sector offers us sustainability and increased food security, and our own farming communities in Leicestershire are among those leading the way.

The Government's Food Strategy promotes more locally sourced food and commits to maintaining the current level of food we produce domestically and increasing production in sectors with the biggest opportunities, such as horticulture, alongside a clear commitment to improving labelling rules to ensure that consumers can be confident that they are buying British food. Through working with producers and supermarkets through the Food Data Transparency Partnership, Defra will improve the data collected on where



our food comes from to make British products more easily recognisable to international buyers. We produce 61 per cent of all the food we need and 74 per cent of that which we can practically grow in the UK. These figures have changed little over the past 20 years. The UK is largely self-sufficient in wheat production, growing 81 per cent of all the wheat that we need here. We are 86 per cent self-sufficient in beef, fully self-sufficient in liquid milk and produce more lamb than we consume. Further, we are nearly 100 percent selfsufficient in poultry, eggs, carrots and swedes. Sectors like soft fruit have seen a trend towards greater self-sufficiency in recent years with an extended UK season displacing imports, but there is still more to do. Its vital we maintain and boost our food security, strengthening the resilience of our supply chains, but crucially boosting domestic production to help protect against future economic shocks, and boosting the consumption of local, seasonal food.

Around our county and beyond, we are incredibly lucky to have farmers who not only produce world-class quality food for our tables, but look after our countryside while they do so. It is important we all play our part by buying local, seasonal produce where we can, and supporting local farm shops, and local shops who source fresh local produce. Wherever you choose to shop, where you can, support our fantastic local British farmers.

OUT AND ABOUT

Thanks to The Woodland Trust and Leicestershire County Council Free Trees, we acquired 15 each of young oak, crab apple and hazel trees together with free stakes and guards. These have been planted by volunteers around the village and will add to our Queen's Green Canopy trees of last year. Let's hope we avoid a drought this year!

The Long Furrow Wildlife Verge, either side of the brookside bus shelter, will see the addition of local provenance black (lesser) knapweed, oxeye daisy and lady's bedstraw plug plants in April. These are perennials and should diversify the verge over time. We are working on new educational signs for the Jubilee Playing Field to cover dog issues. Dogs are, of course, more than welcome on the Playing Field provided they are under the control of responsible owners. The signs will also cover risky activities such as golf, horse riding, trail biking, quad biking.
